Job description

- Job title: Curator (Children, Young People and Families)
- Contract: Fixed term (18 months), with the potential to become permanent, subject to funding
- Hours: Part-time, four days per week (30 hours per week, a job share would be considered)
- Salary: £30,000 pro rata (£24,000 for four days per week)
- **Benefits:** Contributory pension, 24 days holiday per annum plus bank holidays (pro rata), birthday day off. (Note: in the autumn we will be trialling a number of additional benefits, including core hours of 10am 4.30pm, a weekly 'wellbeing hour' and a personal access to culture budget)
- Reports to: Head of Social Practice
- Manages: Project assistants, artist facilitators and other freelancers

Purpose of the role

Lead the delivery and development of a dynamic portfolio of social practice projects, including Flourish, Cultivate Create, and Young Photographers.

Collaborate with the Head of Social Practice and curatorial colleagues on the strategic development of ACAVA's social practice programming, with a specific focus on work with children, young people, and families.

Foster a culture of co-creation, ensuring that communities, artists, and partners are integral to ACAVA's Social Practice work.

Key responsibilities

Programme delivery

- Instill and nurture a culture of co-creation between ACAVA staff, communities, facilitators and partners
- Maintain and build strategic relationships with communities and partners
- Ensure programming is delivered to time, on budget and is reported as required by our funders and partners
- Liaise with the Communications Team to ensure programming is publicised as required, including creating content for newsletters and social media
- Lead community building, ensuring children, young people and families are supported to access activity
- Lead on the administration associated with project delivery, including freelancer contracts, participant sign up / allocation of places
- Plan and implement internal evaluation of programmes for reporting and development purposes
- Create opportunities for reflective practice among project delivery teams, contributing to development of social practice
- Lead the recruitment of new freelance artists and facilitators to deliver programmes
- Collaborate with Head of Social Practice and Head of Professional Development to provide ongoing pastoral support and access to professional development opportunities for artists and creative practitioners delivering our programmes
- Lead on the recruitment and line management of Project Assistants
- Ensure all activity complies with the relevant company policies, with particular attention to safeguarding and health and safety

Programme development

Working with the Head of Social Practice:

- Develop existing and new social practice projects in line with organisational strategy
- Undertake curatorial research to support the development of the programme
- Identify opportunities for new collaborations that support the organisations strategic aims
- Identify and apply to potential funding streams in collaboration with the Head of Fundraising
- Engage in regular team meetings, creating opportunity for peer support and collective problem solving
- Engage with the wider Social Practice and Professional Development Teams to ensure we deliver a cohesive and complimentary programme
- Work with the Head of Social Practice to position ACAVA's programming within the wider sector

- Knowledge of contemporary arts and curatorial practices within a socially engaged context
- Experience of working directly with children, young people and families within a cultural context

- Experience of building and maintaining collaborative relationships with partner organisations; this could include community and voluntary sectors and statutory services including schools, local authorities and the NHS
- Ability to manage projects, including interpersonal relationships, timelines and budgets

- Experience of financial management, monitoring and controlling budgets.
- Knowledge of fundraising and reporting processes from public and / or private sources
- Excellent written, verbal and digital communication skills.
- Excellent ability to multi-task, delegate and prioritise in a busy working environment.

ACAVA is a leading arts education charity that evolved from artist-led initiatives in the early 1970s. For 50 years we have been amongst the UK's most progressive affordable studio and workspace providers.

With a portfolio of 15 studio buildings, exhibition spaces and workshops across eight London boroughs, one building in Essex and an industrial heritage site in Stoke-on-Trent we support a community of over 400 creative practitioners, cultural organisations and creative SMEs.

A pioneer of delivering arts in health and wellbeing settings for over 30 years, we bring professional artists together with local communities in co-created programmes that explore art and creativity and deliver creative, social and economic value. In recognition of the significance of this work, in 2022, ACAVA was shortlisted for the Award for Civic Arts Organisations by the Calouste Gulbenkian Foundation and King's College London; and was a joint winner of the Culture Health and Wellbeing Alliance's Collective Power Award for the Grenfell Memorial Community Mosaic. Starting days before the Grenfell Tower fire in June 2017, Flourish, a family learning programme, adapted to become a safe space for local families to connect and create together in the days, months and years after the tragedy. It has evolved to become an ongoing school holiday art programme for families in North Kensington and Wembley with primary school-aged children. It offers a creative space for families to enjoy learning new skills with professional artists. You can read more about the programme here.

Alongside the other Grenfell Recovery programmes we developed Young Photographers, a mentorship for young adults with an interest in building a career as a professional photographer. You can read more about the programme here.

The most recent addition to our portfolio of Grenfell Recovery projects is Cultivate Create, a creative growing project for families with a focus on wellbeing and building emotional resilience. It was developed in response to need identified by local families during the pandemic and provides a safe space for families to be creative and connect to nature.
